Great Start in Bimini!

Do you remember turning 16? Was there a lot of hype? Did you start to drive? Did you think you were so old and wise?

This Bimini research season is my 16th. Quite frankly, I'm not sure how to feel about that! But, I do know that it has been great so far. Though we haven't actually had a ton of time on the water, searching for dolphins, DCP Master's student Nicole did return in April right before we welcomed back Dr. Stephen Turnbull. Dr. Turnbull was one of DCP's first Bimini field classes and, after a few years off, he once again brought students from University of New Brunswick Saint John (UNBSJ). This group was amazing! What a refreshingly nice and focused group of students. And despite the raging wind forecast, the weather was great. The course content covered much about the marine environment, so the students also got to snorkel several reefs, view Caribbean reef sharks and southern stingrays, snorkel around mangroves and, of course, see dolphins. There was so much going on that we didn't even get a chance to do our beach clean-up! Thankfully, an island wide clean-up was organized on UNBSJ's departure day, so although we did not get to help out, the beach still felt the love. Now: to stop the litter in the first place...

wonderful visit with Bimini Adventures' mid-May guests. Sharing information about dolphins and hearing the guests' experiences and questions is truly invigorating. Their time and their support were so wonderful!

We've had a good start to observing the Bimini Adopt-A-Dolphins. So far, we've seen Romeo (#10), Juliette (#12), Tina (#14), Lil' Jess (#35), Cerra (#38), Niecey (#48), Tim (#69), Leslie (#80), Vee (#101), Sulfur (#102), and possibly Noodle (#94). We're still reviewing photos and video to confirm Noodle and to see if there were other confirmed sightings! On 22 May, I also welcomed J.P., our first Short Field Experience Intern, to the island. J.P. first met DCP and Bimini during a field course with Sacred Heart University. He's already been hard at work! Just one day later, Nicole returned to help supervise J.P.'s work, collect data and ensure that our May eco-tour guests have the best experience possible.

The eco-tour guests began arriving on Friday 25th with our first boat trip scheduled for Saturday. We have some challenging weather due to Tropical Storm Alberto. TS Alberto is not predicted to directly impact Bimini, but the surrounding weather system is kicking up wind and bringing rain. The eco-tour group is still on Bimini as this Gazette issue headed to your inbox. It's been great to have familiar faces back on-island and meet new friends and supporters.

Name-A-Dolphin

Bimini Atlantic spotted dolphin DCP ID#101 needs a name!

Wondering where the Adopt-A-Wild-Dolphins get their names? Well, wonderful and generous DCP supporters name them! And, you can be the next person to name a wild dolphin through DCP's Name-A-Dolphin program!

DCP ID#110 is a juvenile, female Atlantic spotted dolphin. DCP has been observing her off the coast of Bimini, The Bahamas, since 2015, when she was already independent from her mom. She is a "clean" dolphin, meaning that like many of the dolphins in this study area, she does not have any major nicks or scars. Even without scars, DCP resarchers can recognize her, year after year, thanks to her unique spot pattern. As she comes by the boat and our cameras, we get the chance to document her new spot development and associations over time. Through the years, she has been seen with younger dolphins, like Sulfur (#102), as well as older females, including Romeo (#10) and Juliette (#12). This past spring, we even saw her in the Bimini harbor with Paul (#99) and Vee (#101). Who will she be with later this summer? And, when will she have her first calf? DCP will be watching the waters off Bimini to find out!

Now that you know a bit more about #110, what name do you think suits her best? The cost to give a name to #110 - a rare and unique opportunity - is \$750 (USD). If you've got a name in mind, you can purchase your name-a-dolphin kit today!

Responsibilities

--Travel to and assist for 12 nights at our Bimini research site --Assist gathering data (general observations, photographs) during 4-6 hour/day boat excursions (weather & schedule dependent)

--Complete photo-identification of dolphins from still photography and video as well as other data entry and analysis tasks

--Assist with on-board and outreach education as well as web-based projects --Represent DCP in an enthusiastic, responsible, mature, and respectful manner

Successful SFE interns work well in a small team, are comfortable on boats and in the water, have a strong attention to detail, and solid general computer skills. Housing is

provided for a \$600 fee (includes utilities and drinking water). Transportation to Bimini and food are not included.

Note: only the following supplemental materials are required: cover letter, resume and one (1) letter of recommendation. Applicants must be 18 years old to apply and preference may be given to those applicants over 21 years old. *At this time, due to housing constraints, only female applicants will be considered.* Applications are ASAP. Due to field schedules, only electronic applications will be accepted. Interviews (via telephone or Skype) will be arranged for selected candidates in early June.

Several past and current human eco-tour participants just might remember some of those dolphins, as much as Kel and I do! DCP was established to provide an avenue to conduct research on dolphin communication and grew to include acoustics, behavior, cognition, ecology, physiology and more. Equally important to our research goal was the intent and aim to share our research results through a variety of engaging and entertaining educational programs. That is, DCP was formed with the dual goals of research and education - a perfect blend to promote conservation messages and offer opportunities for people of all ages to learn about and experience dolphins from our science-based perspective. And, we plan to keep following and promoting those goals into the future.

I could go into more detail here and wax poetic about DCP and how our programs have grown over the years, not the least of which is in partnership with at least 12 universities! But, this announcement about DCP's approaching anniversary is an alert to those of you with long memories and a penchant for sharing stories. Over the next 6-12 months, DCP would like you to send us your stories and any photos you'd be willing to share about your experiences with DCP, or any of the DCP team including the dolphins. This spring, I received two separate reports of Atlantic spotted dolphins in the bay of Bimini. Keep in mind, DCP has completed 17 annual research seasons off Bimini (we're in the midst of our 18th - my 16th!). In all these years, the first confirmed report of spotteds in the harbor came last fall, soon after Hurricane Irma (FYI: those dolphins were very close to the opening of the bay/harbor and seemed to be just fine). So...what's up with coming into the harbor, dolphins?

The harbor groups included Romeo (#10), Leslie (#80), and an un-named adult female, with their calves, in the March explorer's club (thank you, Atmo & Amlas!). In late April, it was Paul (#99), Vee (#101), and un-named #110 (see page 5 if you want to give #110 her name!). All the dolphins were looking healthy and not stressed (but circling

in an atypical area). As we keep the potential of spotted dolphins in the Bimini harbor in the forefront of our minds, we hope boaters, kayakers, and paddleboarders will be safe and respectful around the dolphins in this area (and everywhere, of course!) – meaning: cautious driving, no touching, no feeding.

Wild animals always keeping it interesting. Who'da thought?!

LEAVING YOUR SUNSCREEN BEHIND? *But what do you mean? I rubbed it in....*



Did you hear the words oxybenzone and Hawai'i in the same news story this month? Wondering what it's all about?

Though you rub sunscreen into your skin, it's still getting into the environment when you go swimming. It's also getting into the marine environment via municipal, residential and ship water discharge. Researchers have found that one popular and effective ingredient, oxybenzone, is not only getting into the ocean, but it's damaging coral. According to their work, "oxybenzone poses a hazard to coral reef conservation and threatens the resiliency of coral reefs to climate change."
